# A New Year, A Strong Community

*As we move into what is traditionally the snowiest month of the year, I hope you're all staying warm. February brings a mix of winter's chill, but the promise of spring just around the corner. It's a wonderful time to celebrate community and reflect on the year ahead. Below are a few updates and reminders to keep in mind:*

## 1. Winter Weather Preparedness

February weather can be unpredictable, with the potential for snow, ice, and bitter temperatures. HOA and VDOT snow removal contractors remain on standby to keep our roads clear.

To help them work efficiently, please remember:

- Park only in designated areas.
- Homeowners are responsible for clearing their own driveways and walkways.
- Check on neighbors who may need assistance.

For helpful reminders on preparing for storms and best practices for clearing your property safely, please review the snow removal reminders on page 15.

## 2. Maintenance Updates

We regularly inspect common areas to ensure they remain safe and well maintained. However, unexpected issues can arise between inspections. If you notice anything such as fallen branches, leaning signs, lighting outages, or damaged equipment, please notify the HOA office so we can address it promptly. You may have noticed that we've redesigned our website to make it more user friendly and to improve access to staff and resources. You can now conveniently submit common area maintenance requests online at [broadlandshoa.org/maintenance-request](http://broadlandshoa.org/maintenance-request).

## 3. Planning Ahead for Spring

By February, we are already well underway with preparations for spring projects—and many of you may be doing the same. If you're considering exterior home improvements, now is an ideal time to:

- Review our architectural guidelines – most exterior approvals require an application.
- Submit your applications early for timely approval
- Plan ahead for contractor scheduling.

Working together helps keep our neighborhood beautiful, consistent, and harmonious.

## 4. Friendly Reminders

### • Trash and Recycling:

Please place containers out no earlier than the evening before pickup and store them promptly afterward. Be sure your trash is secured—wind and animals can scatter debris into common areas, and cleanup costs ultimately come from homeowner assessments.

### • Pet Courtesy:

Please clean up after your pets and keep them leashed at all times while in the community. We have 90 pet waste stations in the community. Please utilize the bags and dispose of them in the trash.

## 5. Get Involved

Volunteering is one of the most meaningful ways to contribute to the place you call home. When residents engage in their community, it strengthens neighbor connections, improves quality of life, and builds a shared sense of pride.

Whether you're interested in, serving on a committee, assisting with events, participating in cleanups, or sharing a skill or expertise, your involvement truly makes a difference.

## Please Tie Down Your Trash on Windy Days

Please be sure to bind newspapers with twine or place loose papers in paper bags before setting out at your curb. Weigh down your bottles, plastics and cans by placing heavier recyclables on top. Ensure that the lid of your trash can is tightly secured. Put smaller lightweight bags of trash together in a larger heavyweight bag. Don't put trash out early and PLEASE no loose "peanuts" or other packing materials. Lastly, if the trash does blow over, or you see a bin out of place, please pick it up even if it isn't yours. Your HOA assessment provides for curbside trash removal. ***There is no budgeted amount for litter removal.*** The Association relies on the homeowners to keep their neighborhoods free of litter and their assessments reasonable.

## Be a Good Neighbor

When using a snow blower, please blow your driveway snow onto your own lawn. Do not blow onto your neighbor's property, the street, or the sidewalk. Thank you.

## March Bingo Night



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## Don't Toss It - Donate It! Broadlands Tween Helps Bridge the Digital Divide

Got an old laptop or tablet gathering dust? Put it to good use by donating it to KindWorks, a local 501(c)(3) nonprofit that refurbishes gently used devices through a group of dedicated volunteers and gives them away — free of charge — to people in need. Right here in Broadlands, one middle schooler is proving that age is no barrier to making an impact. Over the past year, this tech-savvy tween has refurbished more than 60 computers, combining his love of technology with a mission to help others.

“I’ve always loved tech and was lucky to find KindWorks,” he says. “I’m helping to collect more devices so we can support more people in our community.” KindWorks launched its Digital Empowerment Initiative in 2020 and has since distributed more than 2,000 laptops and tablets. Each device is securely wiped, upgraded with a fresh operating system, and loaded with free productivity software before being given — entirely free — to someone who needs it. These devices help college students attend classes, job seekers complete training, and others learn English.

“Every donated device helps reduce e-waste and transforms a life,” says Megan Columbus, KindWorks Digital Empowerment Co-chair.

If you have a working laptop or tablet (under 10 years old) that still powers on, you can drop it off between Feb 1 - 28 in the bin located inside the HOA Office at 21907

Claiborne Parkway during normal business hours, or contact the local volunteer at [jkindworks@gmail.com](mailto:jkindworks@gmail.com) to make drop-off arrangements. Let’s follow this local student’s lead — your old device could power someone’s future!

KindWorks accepts laptops, laptop power adapters, and laptop sleeves/cases (no desktops, cell phones, monitors, or other peripherals).

*Broadlands Community Outreach is excited to partner with a local volunteer with KindWorks, a local nonprofit organization, to collect used computers during the month of February. These computers will be refurbished and distributed at no cost to low-income students, families, and individuals in our community. This initiative aims to increase access to services, enhance digital literacy, and reduce the amount of electronics sent to landfills. Remember to ask your workplace and friends about donating their old computers as they upgrade to new ones!*

## DONATION REQUIREMENTS

- ✓ Laptops and tablets only please
- ✓ All devices must power on
- ✓ Screens must be in-tact with no cracks
- ✓ Laptops should be newer than 2015
- ✓ Please do not remove hard drives
- ✓ PCs can be Windows 8, Windows 10, or Windows 11
- ✓ All types of MacBooks are accepted
- ✗ **No desktops, keyboards, printers or other peripherals are needed**

*Local KindWorks volunteers will wipe computers clean of files and settings, add necessary hardware or peripherals, and install current operating systems and free software. They have refurbished and donated over 2,000 computers in recent years.*

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## Preventing Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Carbon monoxide, or CO, is a poisonous gas that can be particularly dangerous because it is colorless and odorless. Headache, nausea, dizziness and even permanent brain damage or death can occur. Hundreds of people die each year from accidental CO poisoning, many of them while using portable generators during severe weather.

A byproduct of burning fuels such as gasoline, propane, kerosene, natural gas, oil, wood or coal, carbon monoxide is emitted from internal combustion made by engines, like those that power lawn mowers, portable generators, cars, power washers and many household appliances such as furnaces, ranges, fireplaces, water heaters and room heaters.

To prevent CO poisoning in your home, be sure to take the following precautions:

- Educate your family about the causes of CO poisoning and how to prevent exposure to this deadly gas.
- Do not use portable generators indoors, including in garages, carports, storage sheds and the like, even with doors and windows open. CO can quickly build to lethal levels in even partially enclosed spaces.
- Do not place pressure washer engines indoors, and, when using pressure washers outdoors, keep engines away from open windows, doors or vents during use, as CO can seep inside through the openings.
- Hire qualified professionals to install new furnaces and appliances and to inspect and service your HVAC system, chimneys and flues.
- Never service fuel-burning appliances without proper knowledge, skills and tools. Always refer to the owners' manual when performing minor adjustments or performing maintenance on fuel-burning equipment.
- Never use portable fuel-burning camping equipment or burn charcoal indoors.
- Never leave a car running in a garage, even with the garage door open.
- Never use your gas oven or clothes dryer to heat your home.
- Never operate unvented fuel-burning appliances in any room where people are sleeping.
- Do not cover the bottom of natural gas or propane ovens with aluminum foil. Doing so blocks the air flow through the appliance and can produce CO.
- Install CO detectors throughout your home, especially in hallways near sleeping areas, and follow the manufacturers' instructions for testing and replacing. Keep detectors unobstructed by furniture or draperies.

## Patriot Disposal Trash, Recycling, and Yard Waste Collection Schedule

### Trash, Recycling, and Yard Waste Collection:

- Place containers out the night before collection day after 6:00pm or before 6:00am the day of pick up.
- Containers should be out of sight by 9:00am on the day following collection.

### Trash Collection:

- Trash pick up days are Mondays and Thursdays.

### Recycling Collection:

- Recycling pick up day is Thursdays.
- Recyclable materials can be co-mingled.
- Plastic bags CANNOT be recycled.
- Scrap metal – Please call Patriot Disposal to set pick-u day 1-703-257-7100: i.e. foil, pie tins, trays, pots and pans, small car parts, grills, bicycles, swings, etc.

### Yard Waste Collection:

- Yard Waste Collection occurs on Mondays from March 1st through December 24th.
- During January & February, yard debris (leaves, grass clippings, brush) may be mixed with trash. Yard waste may not be mixed with recycling.
- Grass clippings and leaves must be set out for pickup in lawn paper bags or in a bin.
- Brush must be less than 4 inches in diameter, cut into 4 foot lengths, and tied in small bundles or bagged.
- Food waste mixed in with yard waste will be accepted, as it can be composted.

### Special/Bulk Pick-ups:

- Please contact Patriot Disposal, 1-703-257-7100 or [customerservice@patriotdisposalservices.com](mailto:customerservice@patriotdisposalservices.com), to arrange pickup of special and/or bulk items.
- Special items will be collected weekly. Some items may incur an additional charge.
- Special items include appliances, mid to large furniture and other large items.

### Trash Containers Notice:

- *If trash containers are stored in public view outside of these times, you may receive violation notices and, if it continues, you may be called to a Hearing before the Board of Directors.*

# Exterior Modifications

Per Article 7, Section 7.5

(a) Additions, Alterations, or Improvements by the Owners -

"No person shall make any addition, alteration, or improvement in or to any Lot or any portion of the Property... which is visible from the exterior of the Lot or such portion of the Property, without the prior written consent of the Covenants Committee."

If you are unsure if approval is required for your project, contact Robin Crews, Modifications/Resale Manager at [rcrews@broadlandshoa.com](mailto:rcrews@broadlandshoa.com) or 703-520-9902. The Committee meets virtually at 7:00pm on the first and third Wednesdays of the month March-October and the third week of the month November-February. *If you wish to attend a meeting, contact Robin Crews, [rcrews@broadlandshoa.com](mailto:rcrews@broadlandshoa.com).* Applications must be submitted by noon on the Wednesday before the meeting by emailing them to [rcrews@broadlandshoa.com](mailto:rcrews@broadlandshoa.com) or delivering them to the HOA Office drop box at 21907 Claiborne Parkway.

Please review the Design Guidelines and submission requirements at [broadlandshoa.org](http://broadlandshoa.org). *Failure to include all required information will delay review of your application.* Once the Committee has reached a decision, the results will be delivered via email. If an email address is not provided, results will be mailed. Emails will be sent from [no-reply@smartwebs365.com](mailto:no-reply@smartwebs365.com) should you wish to add this email address to your contact list to ensure prompt delivery. Please check your inbox and junk/spam folders or contact the HOA office at 703-520-9902 if you have not received your results within 10 days following the meeting.

## Are You Selling Your Home?

Save yourself time and aggravation by ensuring you have approved applications for all exterior changes or additions made on your property before listing your home. Walk around your home and look for any maintenance violations such as siding repair, exterior trim maintenance, deck/fence repair, fresh coat of paint or stain maintenance, mailbox unit repair, removal of any mildew, screen window repair or roof repair. Refer to your property plat to locate your property lines because you may have accidentally placed something in the common area that will need to be removed before settlement.

**When you sell your home, you are required to request a resale disclosure package for the buyer.** Once the request has been executed, it notifies the HOA to come to your property to perform a resale inspection. The inspectors will look for any structures that have not been approved by the Modifications Subcommittee, that are not in compliance, and for maintenance violations. The results of the resale inspection are embedded in the resale disclosure package that is provided for the buyer. It is the seller's responsibility to rectify all violations found on the property before settlement of the home. If any violations are not rectified before settlement, then the new owner will be responsible.

There are submission procedures on the HOA website, [broadlandshoa.org](http://broadlandshoa.org), to help guide you through the application process. Please refer to the online Design Guidelines for detailed information.

The Design Guidelines provide a framework to maintain design quality and encourage consistency throughout the community. During the month of February, we will be focusing on homes with holiday decorations still on display: Santas, his prancing reindeer, smiling snowmen, and all the lovely green wreaths. We all enjoyed the beautiful show but now it is time to pack up the decorations, sit back and enjoy your holiday memories. All holiday decorations should be removed by February 1st.

Finally, be sure to secure your trash. All boxes should be flattened and tied together. Put garbage bags in your toters to keep animals from tearing open the bags and ensure that the lid of your trash container is tightly secured. If a trash container does blow over, or you see a bin out of place, please pick it up even if it is not yours, and place it out of the way. Our community relies on our homeowners to keep their neighborhood free from litter.

# HOME CHECKLIST

### Clean and Keep Free of Mildew/Build-Up:

- Siding
- Basement walk-ups and surrounding areas
- Front stairs and sidewalks
- Decks, fences, sheds

### Damaged Exterior Trim/Rotting Wood

- Trim around doors, windows, garage & corners
- Roof line (fascia and rake boards) trim and wrap
- Soffits are properly secured
- Windows (dormer, bay, etc.)
- Bump-out areas
- Porches, decks, sheds
- Mailbox post

### Fresh Coat of Paint/Stain

*A fresh coat should be uniform and consistent in appearance. Application is required for color changes or new stains.*

- Trim (exterior trim should have a consistent color throughout)
- Shutters, front doors, railings
- Fences, sheds, trash enclosures
- Mailbox post

### Repair & Replace

- Falling/damaged lattice on decks and fences
- Fence/gate repairs such as warped, cracked, missing, and peeled (splintered) boards, including top rails

### Home Exterior

- Missing shutters
- Loose siding or wrapped trim
- Crooked, missing, and broken light fixtures
- Damaged mailboxes (i.e. rusted, missing flags)
- Trash and recycling containers stored out of sight
- Garage doors in good condition (i.e. no dents/broken panels)

### Landscaping

- Neat appearance of the lawn, free of weeds, and edged
- Landscape beds free of weeds, fresh mulch applied (no red)
- Bags of mulch, dirt, etc. properly stored out of view
- Remove dead bushes and trees (may need approval)

### Exterior Modifications

*The following items require approval from the Modifications Subcommittee before starting these projects. This list includes common projects but is not a complete list of all projects needing approval:*

- Decks, fences, sheds, trash enclosures
- Paint/stain color changes
- Addition of storm/screen doors
- Play equipment, including trampolines and basketball goals
- Changes to light fixtures – if style/color/size are not the same as the originally installed fixtures
- Patios, walkways, retaining walls, pools
- Addition of lattice/privacy screens and change in building materials



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## SNOW REMOVAL GUIDELINES

- The primary objective is to make the private streets and sidewalks reasonably safe and passable within a reasonable timeframe after the end of snowfall. Residents should be aware that during and after the storm, streets, trails, and sidewalks may be snow-covered and/or icy.
- Snow removal will generally commence after two inches (2") of snow has accumulated on paved surfaces, or at the discretion of the Association. Crews will follow an assigned route throughout the community, clearing the roadways as they go, then moving on to the next area. They will return to check for any additional snow, ice accumulation, or wind-related issues, and make further passes as conditions dictate.
- Please allow 12 hours after the storm ends for every 2" of snow accumulation for the roads to be cleared or re-cleared. If you are essential personnel or are required to be available for work around the clock, please make prior arrangements or park on a VDOT-maintained street.
- Ice melt may be applied at the discretion of the Association, depending on weather conditions.
- Snow removal equipment contracted by the Association will maintain a minimum of thirty-six inches (36") of clearance from all parking spaces.
- To allow for optimal snow clearing, vehicles should be parked in a garage, driveway, or parking space during expected inclement weather. Failure to do so will result in a less efficient snow removal process. Vehicles parked curbside could become stuck due to snow deflecting off plows. If this occurs due to an unmoved vehicle, the owner will be responsible for clearing the area.
- Snowplow operators push the snow off the roadway in smooth, continuous passes, which may result in snow being deposited in gutters and on road shoulders and occasionally blocking driveways. Homeowners should be aware that if they clear snow from driveway entrances or parking spaces before the street or parking lot is plowed, the snow may be unintentionally pushed back into the driveway or parking space. In such cases, neither the Association nor the snow removal contractor is responsible for clearing deflected snow. It is the responsibility of the resident to clear this snow. To minimize this issue, we recommend shoveling snow to the right of your driveway (as you face the road), which can reduce the amount of snow pushed back in front of your driveway.
- Snow should never be deposited onto streets, sidewalks, parking spaces, or parking lot islands. If shoveling or using a snow blower, deposit the snow onto grass-covered areas. The Association is not responsible for the removal of snow piled in the street, in parking spaces, or on the sidewalk by residents or a contractor hired by residents.
- The contractor will make efforts to clear the areas around the Association-owned cluster mailboxes in the townhome areas so that mail delivery and pick-up can occur after the streets and paths have been addressed.
- The association will plow/treat asphalt trails along major roadways such as Claiborne Parkway, Truro Parish Drive, Waxpool Road, and Demott Drive. Generally, the association does not plow asphalt trails that are not located along these main roadways.
- The wooded trails remain shaded much of the time, which means they are prone to persistent icy conditions regardless of treatment. Applying resources to these trails is not an effective use of homeowner funds. The use of trails, especially in winter conditions, is at the user's own risk. Snow and ice can change rapidly due to temperature fluctuations, wind, and lack of sunlight, so users should use caution when traveling in these areas.
- Both during and after a storm, even plowed/treated streets, trails, and sidewalks may still be snow-covered and/or icy. Conditions can change rapidly due to temperature fluctuations, wind, and lack of sunlight. Travelers should always use caution and proceed at their own risk.
- Please yield to plow trucks and other snow removal equipment. Obey equipment signage, such as "stay back 100ft". It is important to give plow trucks and equipment operators ample space to safely maneuver and perform their work.
- Broadlands Association is not responsible for removing the snow from sidewalks adjacent to townhomes or single-family homes. Snow removal from these sidewalks, and from driveways, driveway aprons, and walkways, is the sole responsibility of the resident.
- According to (Chapter 1022 of the Loudoun County Codified Ordinances, the owner/occupant of a property that has a public sidewalk adjoining or touching the property in front, rear, or either side is required to clear or treat that sidewalk for snow and ice within 6 hours of a snowfall (by 12:00 pm noon for overnight snowfall). Residents of properties abutting common areas (i.e., along Ellzey Drive) are also responsible for clearing those sidewalks. The County Department of Building and Development is responsible for the enforcement of this ordinance.

*Our snow removal efforts focus on maintaining clear drive lanes on HOA-owned streets for safe access in the community. Contractors do not clear snow to the curb, and the HOA is not responsible for clearing common area parking spaces or areas next to parked vehicles—this is the responsibility of the vehicle owners. While we strive for effective snow management, we cannot control freeze-thaw cycles or remove all snow and ice. Clearing the main paths is our priority, but navigating winter conditions is ultimately up to individual drivers and pedestrians.*

## Stay Informed with the New Crime Dashboard

### From the Loudoun County Sheriff's Office



Knowing what is happening in your neighborhood is one of the best ways to stay safe and connected. To make that easier, the Loudoun County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) has launched an online Crime Dashboard that provides easy access to detailed crime data for your community and all of Loudoun County.

Updated daily, the dashboard is simple to use, and its goal is clear: to help you be better-informed about your surroundings.

#### Easy Access at Your Fingertips

The dashboard is free and available to anyone at [sheriff.loudoun.gov/crimedashboard](http://sheriff.loudoun.gov/crimedashboard). It works on desktop computers, tablets, and smartphones.

#### What the Crime Dashboard Offers

The dashboard provides a map-based view of incidents reported to the LCSO, along with a searchable breakdown of categories such as theft, vandalism, burglary, assault, and more. You can filter the information by date range, day and time, geographic area, or type of crime, victim or suspect. For example, if your HOA is considering new safety measures such as

lighting, cameras, or neighborhood watch efforts, you can use the dashboard to see what types of issues have been reported nearby.

#### Why It Matters for HOA Communities

Many residents already share updates through community boards, emails, or social media groups. While those platforms are useful, they sometimes rely on secondhand information. The Crime Dashboard provides unfiltered information directly from official reports received by the LCSO.

#### That means HOA leaders and residents can:

- Spot trends – Notice if there has been a rise in car break-ins, package thefts, or other crimes in your neighborhood.
- Support community initiatives – Use real data to guide neighborhood watch groups or HOA safety committees.
- Stay proactive – Know when it is time to remind neighbors about simple prevention tips, such as locking vehicles or securing deliveries.
- Build confidence – You now have daily access to accurate, relevant and timely information.

#### A Tool for Awareness, Not Alarm

While an isolated incident can feel unsettling, the Crime Dashboard shows that crime in Loudoun County remains comparatively low. In 2025 alone, serious crime is down about 13 percent from the previous year, and Loudoun continues to be one of the safest major counties in the nation.

#### Working Together for Safer Communities

The LCSO recognizes that safety is about partnership. Tools like the Crime Dashboard are designed to strengthen the connection between deputies and residents. When neighbors stay informed, they are better equipped to look out for one another. Whether it is reporting suspicious activity, reminding a neighbor to lock a car door, or simply feeling more confident about local safety, awareness makes a difference.

#### Take a Look Today

## Frozen Pipes

When the weather turns colder, water expands as it freezes and this can put tremendous stress on whatever is containing it, including metal or plastic pipes. Usually, pipes that freeze are exposed to severe cold weather, like outdoor hose bibs, and water supply pipes in unheated interior areas like basements, garages, or kitchen cabinets. To keep meters from freezing during extreme cold snaps, it is important to have a constant flow of water going through the meter.

### During significant cold snaps, follow these tips:

- To prevent your pipes from freezing, allow a faucet to trickle cold water. The faucet you choose should be the one that is the greatest distance from your main water shutoff valve and at the highest point in your home. This is especially important if your property has experienced frozen meters in the past.
- Open the cabinets beneath any place with a water supply, such as the kitchen and bathroom sinks. This will allow warm air to circulate. (Remove any toxic substances first if there are small children or pets in the home.)
- If your pipes freeze, never thaw a pipe with an open flame. Use warm water to soak towels, then wrap the towels around the frozen pipes.

*If you recently had your meter thawed by a Loudoun Water staff member, please take care to prevent your meter from refreezing by following the above tips.*

### Here are a few preventive measures that can help you when temperatures dip below freezing:

- Whether you're at home or away traveling, keep your thermostat set no lower than 55F. Travelers will often make the mistake of turning their thermostats off thinking it will save on their heating bill when in reality, they'll come home to frozen pipes.
- Shut off and drain the pipes leading to your outside faucets and/or hose bibs so no water is left to freeze, expand and

cause a leak in these lines.

- Keep doors and windows to the outside tightly closed.
- Insulate pipes in any unheated or drafty areas. Hardware and plumbing supply stores carry insulation to keep pipes from freezing.
- Seal all leaks in crawl spaces and basements.
- Know where your main shutoff valve is and label it. Minimize the potential for water damage by ensuring that everyone in the household knows how to shut off the water in case of an emergency.

*Freezing pipes are one of the most expensive risks homeowners face. Know the location of your main water shutoff valve. Minimize the potential of water damage by ensuring that everyone in the house knows how to shut off the water in an emergency. ## Ask Dr. Mike

### **Dr. Mike,**

Our son is 7 years old. His teacher contacted us to discuss the school doing an evaluation on him since he is having attention problems, hyperactivity and behavior problems, and language learning problems in the classroom. She also said that he seems to get anxious socially with the other kids often. She suggested that he may be dyslexic given his struggles with reading and writing, and she said the evaluation they do would identify that if he is. My husband and I are hesitant to have our son evaluated because we don't want to label him in the school system. We also recognize that if he does have real learning difficulties they should be addressed. Our neighbor had their son evaluated privately a while back and got a lot out of that, so we know that's an alternative to having it done at the school. We'd appreciate your thoughts.

### **Concerned Parents in Loudoun**

#### **Dear Concerned Parents in Loudoun,**

Thank you for reaching out and sharing your concerns about your son. It's always difficult for parents to hear that their child is struggling in school, but your openness to understanding what's happening is the most important first step toward helping him.

From what you've described, his teacher has noticed a combination of concerns—difficulty learning new language based material, staying focused, and managing his behavior in class, along with signs of anxiety in social situations. She's also raised the possibility of dyslexia because he's mixing things up when reading and writing, and she's recommended testing. These observations are valuable because teachers often see children in structured settings where academic and social demands can highlight patterns that might not appear as clearly at home. It's understandable that you're hesitant to have your son labeled at such a young age. Many parents share that concern. Labels can feel limiting, but early evaluation doesn't have to define him—it simply helps you understand how he learns, where he struggles, and what supports might make school a better fit. The goal is not to place him in a box but to uncover information that can guide more personalized strategies for his growth.

There are a few possible reasons behind the challenges his teacher observed. Dyslexia is one, particularly if he's reversing letters, struggling to sound out words, or finding reading unusually difficult for his age. Another possibility is ADHD, which often shows up as inattention, hyperactivity, or impulsivity, all of which can affect academic

performance and behavior. Anxiety can also play a role, especially if he seems nervous in social situations or reluctant to engage with peers. Sometimes, these challenges overlap—children may have a combination of learning, attention, and emotional factors that interact with one another in the classroom.

The best next step is to gather more information rather than making quick assumptions. Begin by discussing your concerns with the school. Most school systems have procedures for educational evaluations, and teachers, counselors, or school psychologists can help you understand what supports are available. You may also wish to talk with your pediatrician, who can rule out any medical factors and provide referrals for specialists if needed. A private neuropsychological evaluation is often the most comprehensive way to understand what's going on. This type of assessment looks at a child's intellectual abilities, language and processing skills, attention, memory, academic achievement, and emotional functioning. It provides a clear picture of your son's unique strengths and challenges, along with concrete recommendations for home and school.

In the meantime, keep providing structure and reassurance at home. Children are especially sensitive to how adults respond to their struggles. Knowing that you believe in him will help reduce anxiety and boost his confidence. Stay in close communication with his teacher so you can monitor progress and adjust support if needed.

If anxiety or attention issues seem to be significant, therapy can also be helpful. Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), in particular, is effective for children who experience worry, difficulty focusing, or frustration related to school. It teaches coping and problem-solving skills that strengthen emotional regulation and self-esteem.

You're right to want to approach this thoughtfully and at a pace that feels right for your family. Whether you choose to begin evaluations now or wait a bit while continuing to observe, remain open to information as it comes. Understanding the "why" behind your son's challenges will empower you to advocate effectively and ensure he receives the right support—both academically and emotionally. Early insight often leads to the most positive outcomes, and your care and attentiveness are already laying that foundation for him.
